## ICJIA Announces Federal Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Awards for Law Enforcement Vehicles

CHICAGO—March 23, 2012. Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority (ICJIA) Executive Director Jack Cutrone today announced recipients of federal fiscal year 2008 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) awards for law enforcement vehicles.

ICJIA designated more than \$460,000 in federal funding to 24 local law enforcement agencies that demonstrated financial and vehicle needs. A maximum of \$20,000 was awarded to each agency, and 75 percent of the funds were designated to departments within communities that had populations of less than 25,000.

"Aging vehicles with increasing maintenance needs are not only costly to local municipalities, they also create a significant public safety issue," said Executive Director Cutrone. "These federal funds will provide police with the reliable vehicles they need to be effective in their communities while helping to alleviate the economic strain that otherwise would have been put on local governments."

Grant applications were evaluated and scored based on a formula to determine regional financial need and each agency's demonstration of equipment need. Agencies awarded will be required to provide a 25 percent cash match from non-federal sources.
