# IIJIS IMPLEMENTATION BOARD

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Created in 2003 by Executive Order No. 16, the IIJIS Implementation Board is an intergovernmental effort dedicated to improving the administration of justice in Illinois by facilitating the electronic sharing of justice information throughout the state. It is a collaborative effort charged with enhancing public safety by making complete, accurate, and timely offender based information available to all justice decision makers.

The executive order directs the Implementation Board to address the challenges identified in the IIJIS Strategic Plan and to set goals and objectives for future justice information systems. The Implementation Board promotes the electronic sharing of justice information by coordinating the development, adoption, and implementation of plans for systems designed to make justice information readily accessible to justice agencies. The responsibilities of the IIJIS Board center on promoting the integration of justice information systems and include: coordinating the development of systems that enhance integration; establishing standards to facilitate the electronic sharing of justice information; protecting individual privacy rights related to the sharing of justice information; and coordinating the funding of integration efforts.

## **POWERS, DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES**

- (a) To promote the integration of justice information systems in Illinois;
- (b) To coordinate the development, adoption and implementation of plans and strategies for sharing justice information;
- (c) To coordinate the development of systems that enhance integration;
- (d) To establish standards to facilitate the electronic sharing of justice information;
- (e) To promulgate policies that protect individuals' privacy rights related to the sharing of justice information;
- (f) To apply for, solicit, receive, establish priorities for, allocate, disburse, grant, contract for, and administer funds from any source to effectuate the purposes of the executive order;
- (g) To promulgate rules or regulations as may be necessary to effectuate the purposes of this executive order;
- (h) To report annually, on or before April 1st of each year to the Governor and the General Assembly, on the Implementation Board's activities in the preceding fiscal year; and
- (i) To exercise any other powers that are necessary and proper to fulfill the duties, responsibilities, and purposes of this executive order and to comply with the requirements of applicable federal or state laws or regulations.

### **Outreach Committee**

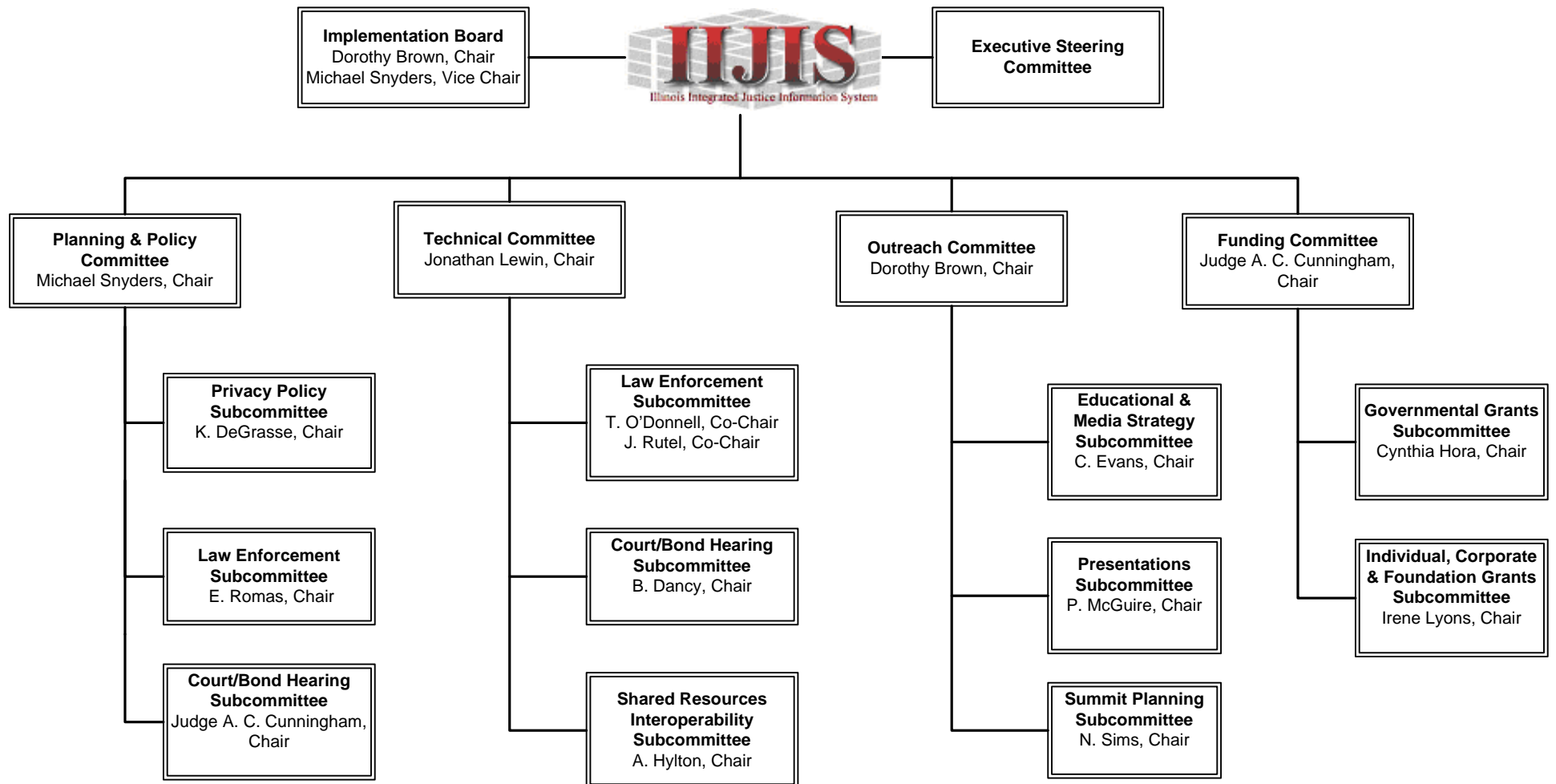

The Funding Committee supports the development of integrated justice information systems in Illinois by identifying funding sources.

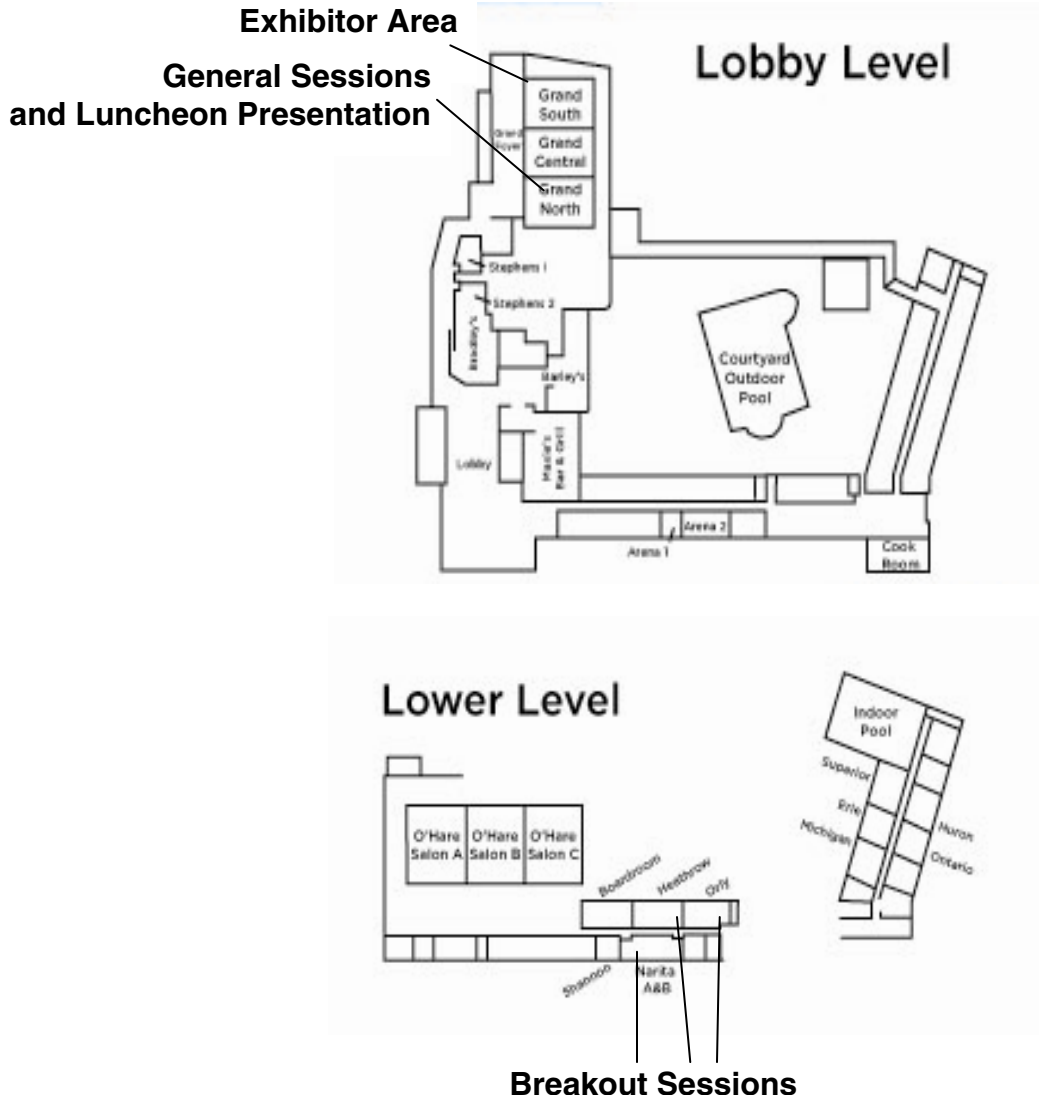
# Illinois Integrated Justice Information System Organizational Chart & Structure

Dorothy Brown was elected as the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County in 2000, becoming the first African-American elected to this countywide office. In November 2008, she was re-elected to a third term. She has won all three elections by overwhelming margins, illustrating solid voter confidence in her abilities. As the official keeper of records for all judicial matters brought into the second largest unified court system in the world, Clerk Brown is responsible for managing an annual operating budget of more than \$100 million and has a workforce of over 2,100 employees.

Clerk Brown graduated Magna cum Laude from Southern University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; holds a Master's in Business Administration with honors from DePaul University; a Jurist Doctorate of Law, with honors, from Chicago-Kent School of Law; and she is a Certified Public Accountant.

Clerk Brown places professionalism over politics in her administration, and she has leveraged her experience and leadership skills into making the Clerk's Office a model of excellence in government service. Her focus has been to bring the Clerk's Office into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century with up-to-date information technology, improved customer service, operational efficiency, employee development and training, and financial accountability.

Additionally, Clerk Brown has established an illustrious record of professional and public service that continues to be lauded and recognized by institutions, organizations and community groups. Among numerous accolades, Clerk Brown was awarded: the 2002 Hillary Rodham Clinton Leadership Award from the Illinois Democratic Women, the 2003 Marks of Excellence Award from the National Forum for Black Public Administrators, the 2003 Women of Achievement Award from the Anti-Defamation League, the 2004 NAACP Medal of Freedom from the Proviso/Leyden Township in Illinois, the 2004 Pakistan Women Association Outstanding Community Service Award, the 2005 "Voice of Freedom Award" from the Harriet Beecher Stowe Fine & Performing Arts Academy, the 2006 Justinian Society of Lawyers Humanitarian Award, the 2006 Indian American Medical Association Public Service Award, the Information Integrity Coalition's 2007 Excellence in Information Integrity Award Finalist, Nielsen's 2007 "Single Mama of the Year" award, the Illinois Institute of Technology 2007 Professional Achievement Award, the Youth Pride Center's 2008 Youth Advocate of the Year Award, Demoiselle 2 Femme's 2008 Community Partnership Award, and the Illinois Traffic Safety Leaders 2009 Joanne Blair Award.

Clerk Brown lives in Chicago and has a daughter, Detris, a graduate of Howard University, who is currently attending London Metropolitan University in London, England.

Colonel Michael R. Snyders is a 23-year veteran of the Illinois State Police. He was promoted to the rank of colonel and serves as the deputy director of the Division of Administration. Currently, he leads the technology, information, research, criminal history, fiscal, human resources, logistical, and strategic management functions of the Illinois State Police.

Col. Snyders' prior appointed positions include deputy director of the Information and Technology Command; lieutenant colonel, second in command, of the Division of Operations where he oversaw patrol, investigation, and intelligence operations; lieutenant colonel in charge of Operation Services Command that consisted of intelligence, commercial vehicle, drug conspiracy, technical services, Medicaid fraud, and computer crimes; captain of investigations, Zone 5 Champaign Office; captain, District 6 Patrol Office in Pontiac; and led ISP intelligence efforts.

Col. Snyders is recognized as an international expert in the field of criminal patrol interdiction and has provided assistance and training to agencies throughout the United States, as well as in Canada, Northern Ireland, Poland, and South America.



## WELCOME ADDRESS

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### ***State Senator John Cullerton President of the Illinois Senate***



State Senator John Cullerton was inaugurated to his first two-year term as President of the Illinois Senate in January, after nearly 30 years of legislative service to the state.

Sen. Cullerton earned a bachelor's degree in political science from Loyola University Chicago and a juris doctorate from Loyola University's prestigious School of Law.

He began his law career by serving as a Chicago Assistant Public Defender for five years before he started with Chicago's law firm of Thompson Coburn Fagel Haber, where he continues working as a partner.



In 1976, Sen. Cullerton's service in public office began after being elected to the Illinois Delegation to the Democratic National Convention. In 1979, he was elected to the Illinois General Assembly and served as a member of the House of Representatives for 12 years. Throughout Sen. Cullerton's six-term career in the Illinois House, he served as the Speaker Pro Tempore and Democratic Floor Leader.

In 1992, Sen. Cullerton was elected to the Illinois Senate, representing the state's 6th Legislative District. Because of his vast knowledge of the law, Sen. Cullerton serves as the Democratic co-chairman of the Senate's Judiciary Civil Law Committee. He also serves as a member of the Judiciary Criminal Law Committee and the Revenue Committee. Sen. Cullerton served as the Senate Majority Caucus Whip from January 2007 to January 2009. His contribution to the Illinois State Senate has been dedicated to issues such as traffic safety, gun control, and the reform to the criminal justice system.

At the conclusion of both the 93rd and 94th General Assembly, Sen. Cullerton was recognized for sponsoring more bills than any other legislator as well as having the most bills signed by the Governor. In addition, he accepted the "Highway Safety Hero" award from the Advocates for Highway and Auto Safety. In December 2000, Sen. Cullerton was honored with the "Distinguished Leadership Service Award" presented to him by Children's Memorial Hospital. The Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police also selected Sen. Cullerton as Public Official of the Year in 2001.



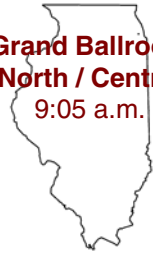

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### **Mayor Bradley Stephens Village of Rosemont**

The Honorable Bradley A. Stephens won a decisive victory in April when he was elected mayor of the Village of Rosemont with 92 percent of the vote. With a true mandate, Mayor Stephens received the support of his Rosemont constituents for the first time. Mayor Stephens originally completed what would have been his father Mayor Donald E. Stephens' 14th consecutive term upon his passing after being unanimously elected mayor of the village by its board of trustees in April 2007.

Mayor Stephens' career spans 28 years of public service. Mayor Stephens has worked in nearly every major department in the village in some capacity, including as an auxiliary policeman and dispatcher in the Rosemont Public Safety Department.

Rosemont has flourished under Mayor Stephens' progressive eye, welcoming a luxury movie theater complex, two world class hotels, five restaurants of national franchise fame, breaking ground for two office buildings, and overseeing new municipal developments. In addition, he has helped increase in the village's bond rating by S & P.

As the mayor and the Rosemont Board of Trustees initiate new development, they also ensure responsible fiscal operations of the Allstate Arena, Donald E. Stephens Convention and Conference Center, and the Rosemont Theatre. Both the Allstate Arena and the Stephens Convention Center have returned revenues to their municipalities without any subsidy. These facilities help make Rosemont an economic engine for the state of Illinois.

Mayor Stephens also is Leyden Township Supervisor, an elected position he has held for the past 15 years. His accomplishments at Leyden Township include expanding, improving and solving open space issues in three parks, a recreation center and a park district, maintaining services while being fiscally responsible, negotiating an agreement for a newly situated sheriff's sub-station, and improving services and communications for the elderly and for veterans, making them aware of entitlements many did not know were available to them.

Mayor Stephens graduated from East Leyden High School in 1987 and began his career as a tradesman in carpentry. He was a carpenter at both the Donald E. Stephens Convention and Conference Center and at the Allstate Arena.

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### Cultivating Integration: Missouri's Grant Funded Efforts

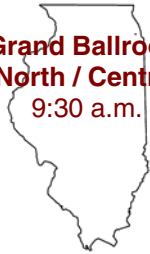

Jeff Barlow is the executive director of the Hawthorn Institute, a public policy consulting firm based in Missouri. He specializes in funding strategies, revenue maximization, strategic planning and performance based budgeting. Mr. Barlow is a member of the criminal justice grants task force in Missouri and works collaboratively with all criminal justice agencies on multi-jurisdictional projects.

The Missouri Office of State Courts Administrator (OSCA) has also employed him since 1997. As the assistant director of Administration and Budget, he is responsible for grants, contracts, state and federal fiscal administration and budgeting for the Missouri Judiciary. Mr. Barlow has administered more than \$70 million in grant expenditures in his 10-year tenure at OSCA.

Prior to working with the judicial branch, Mr. Barlow served the U.S. House of Representatives as casework director & state government liaison for Missouri's 9th Congressional District. He also served as a leadership aide in the Missouri House of Representatives from 1994 to 1997, serving as chief staff person for legislative task forces on budget, taxation, government efficiency, and technology.

From 1992 to 1994, he served in various positions within the Executive Branch's Department of Social Services. During this time, he served as a planner, tracking the agency's \$3.8 billion budget and coordinating fiscal notes for proposed legislation affecting the department. He also served as the assistant for special projects in the Division of Family Services, writing welfare reform initiatives. Mr. Barlow started his career in state government as a welfare caseworker determining eligibility for food stamps and Medicaid.

He attained his bachelor's degree in political science and Spanish from the College of the Ozarks in Southwest Missouri and his master's degree in public administration from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He is also a Fellow of the Institute for Court Management at the National Center for State Courts. Mr. Barlow has served as national faculty for both the Institute for Court Management and for the Performance Institute, and has conducted state and national conferences for the Hawthorn Institute. He is also a state-certified information technology project manager and an author and speaker on integration and automation funding.

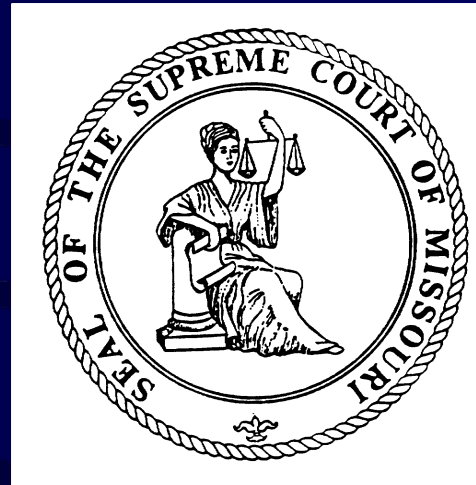

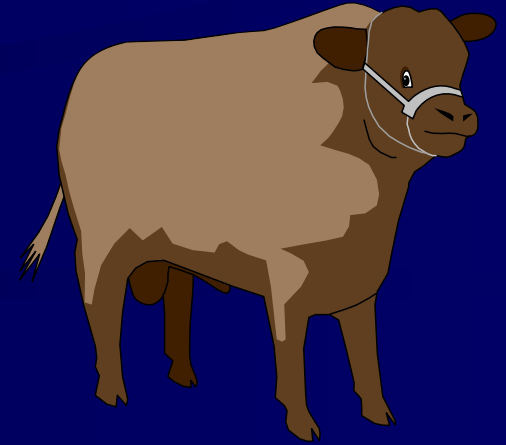

To ensure our information technology investments serve the business goals of the state, the Office of Information Technology continues to support and promote the project management policies, guidelines and best practices adopted by the Information Technology Advisory Board. The project management training program will continue to evolve to better meet the needs of the state's information technology community.

With new e-government initiatives being developed and the need for collaboration between agencies to share data across diverse platforms, it has become apparent that a standardized methodology of project management tracking and reporting is needed. As project managers from individual agencies work together toward a common set of goals and objectives, it only makes sense that they share a common language or methodology of project management. This shared language has been identified in the Missouri Project Management Methodology Manual, which is currently on version 2.0 and will continue to be updated as new and revised best practices are identified.

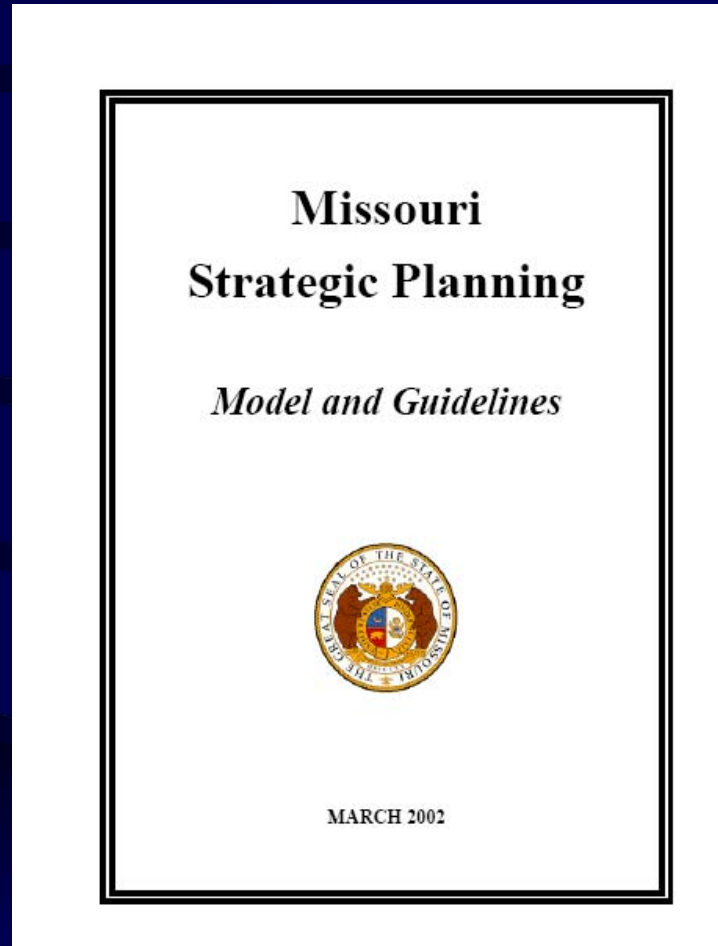

# Shared Vision & Legislative Authority

**Criminal records and justice information advisory committee, established-- purpose--members--meetings, quorum--minutes, distribution, filing of.**

43.518. 1. There is hereby established within the department of public safety a "Criminal Records and Justice Information Advisory Committee" whose purpose is to:

- (1) Recommend general policies with respect to the philosophy, concept and operational principles of the Missouri criminal history record information system established by sections 43.500 to 43.530, in regard to the collection, processing, storage, dissemination and use of criminal history record information maintained by the central repository;
- (2) Assess the current state of electronic justice information sharing; and
- (3) Recommend policies and strategies, including standards and technology, for promoting electronic justice information sharing, and coordinating among the necessary agencies and institutions; and
- (4) Provide guidance regarding the use of any state or federal funds appropriated for promoting electronic justice information sharing.

# NICS Improvement Amendments Act of 2007

- The Attorney General shall make grants to each State, consistent with State plans for the integration, automation, and accessibility of criminal history records, for use by the State court system to improve the automation and transmittal of criminal history dispositions, records relevant to determining whether a person has been convicted of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence, court orders, and mental health adjudications or commitments, to Federal and State record repositories in accordance with sections 102 and 103 and the National Criminal History Improvement Program.

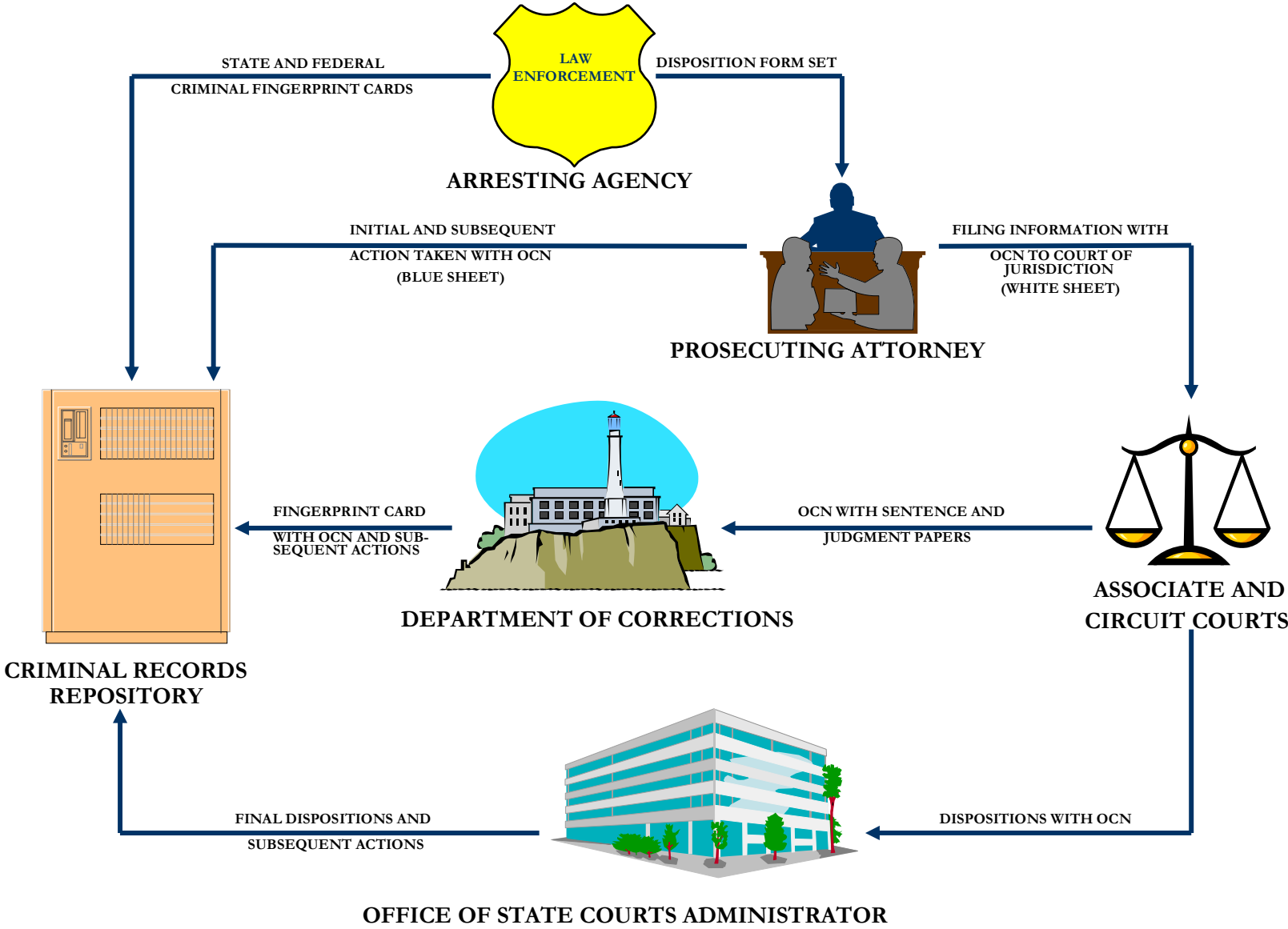

# CRIMINAL RECORDS FLOWCHART

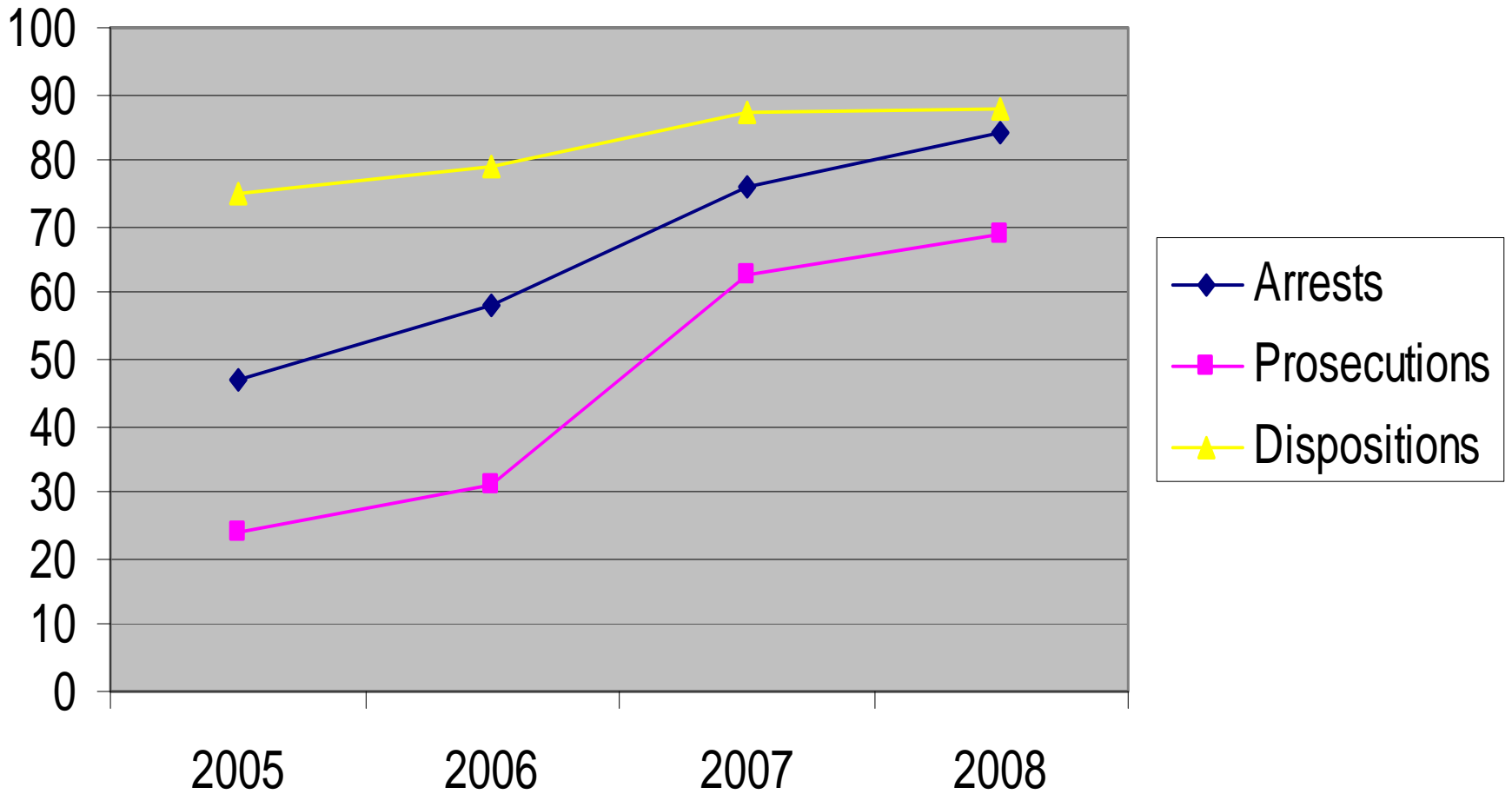

## Percentage of Electronic Submissions to Criminal History



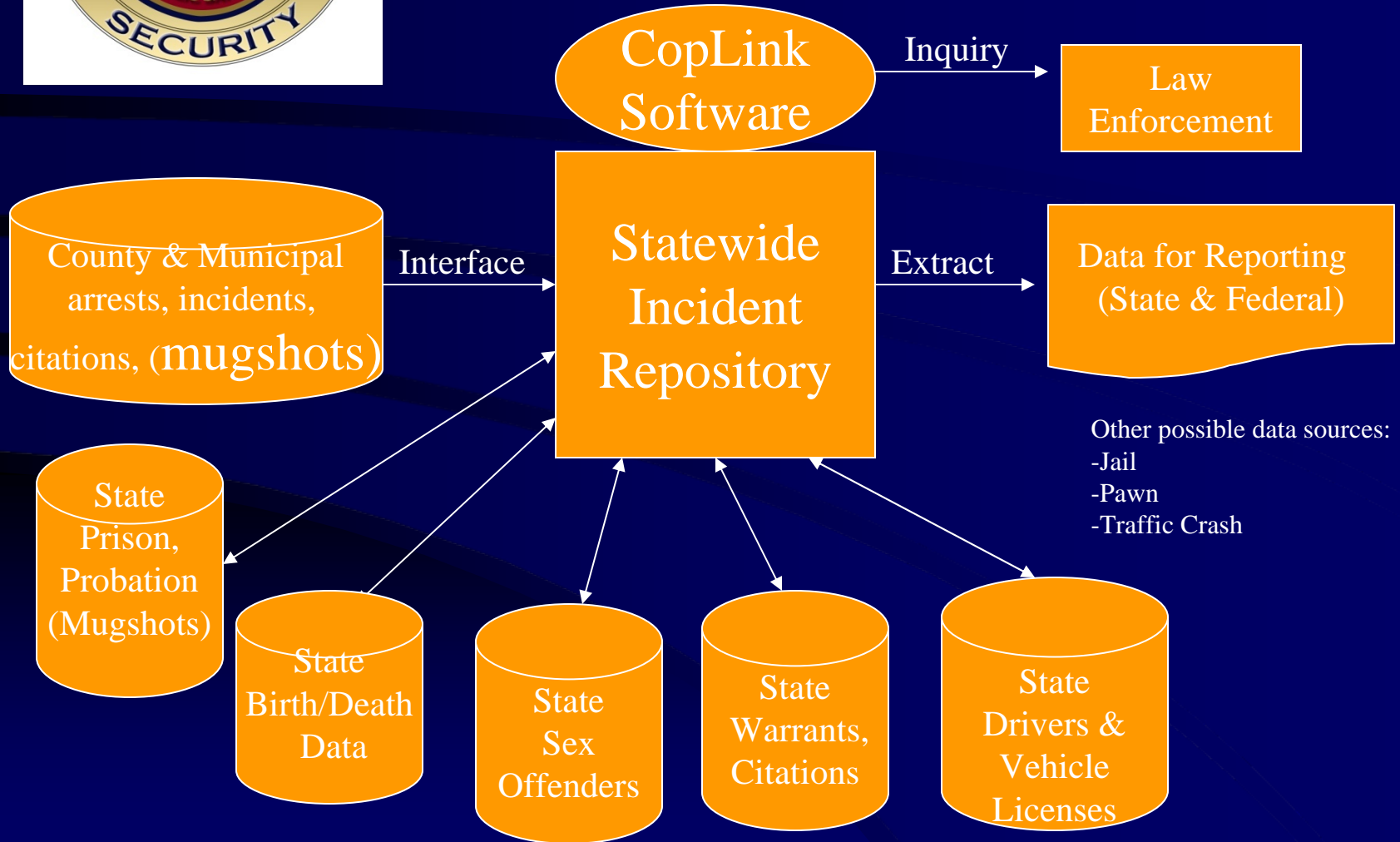

Prior to becoming a member of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Mr. Clemonds worked as a patrolman for a municipal police department and as chief deputy for a sheriff's department. As well as serving as a civilian law enforcement professional, Mr. Clemonds served 20 years in the U.S. Army (Missouri Army National Guard) as a military police officer. He retired at the rank of major and held positions of enlisted military policeman, platoon leader, company commander, intelligence officer, operations and training officer, provost marshal, and battalion executive officer.

Since 1997, Mr. Clemonds has been a member of the National Grants Management Association. He has taught basic grant writing, grants management, and funding for Public Safety Wireless Network (now SAFECOM, Department of Homeland Security), The Performance Institute in Washington, D.C., and the Hawthorn Institute. He teaches grant and policing topics at the Midwestern Regional Community Policing Institute and Missouri Western State College. He is a certified National Incident Management Systems trainer for Central Missouri University. Mr. Clemonds has a bachelor's degree in business management and a Grants Management Certificate.

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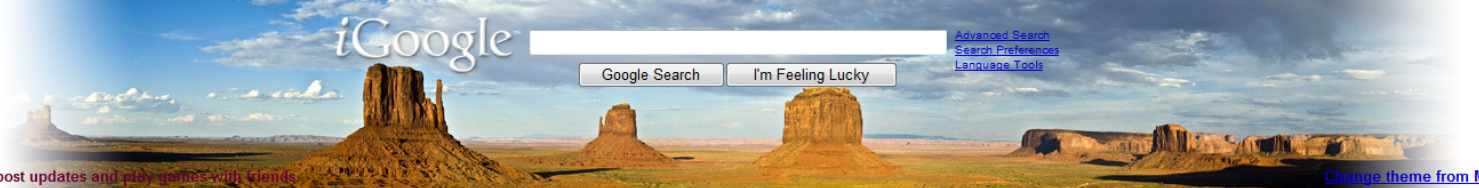

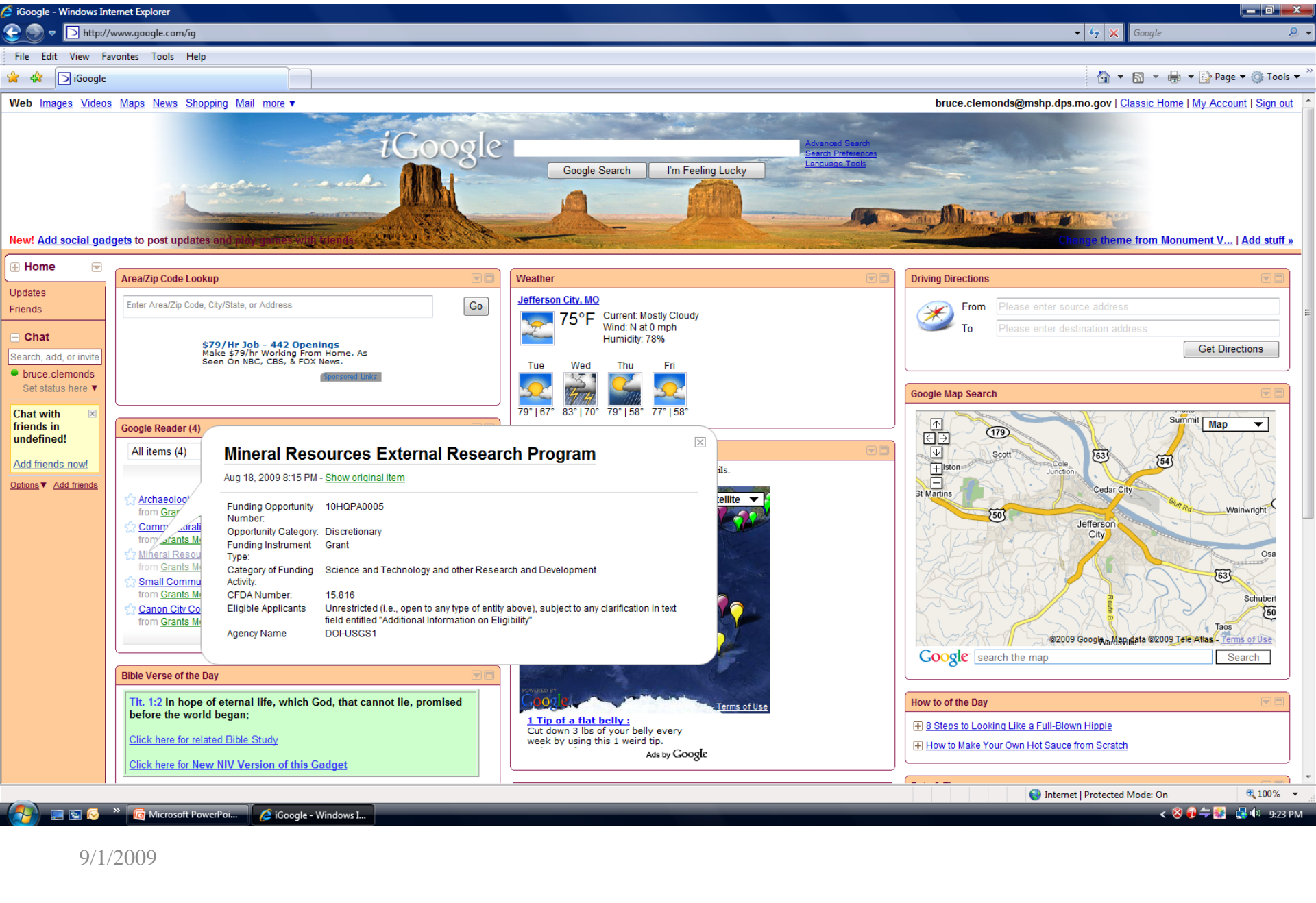

The Department offers funding opportunities to conduct research, to support law enforcement activities in state and local jurisdictions, to provide training and technical assistance, and to implement programs that improve the criminal justice system.

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**Types of Funding**

Much like other Federal agencies, OJP offices and bureaus provide three types of funding to State, local, and private agencies and organizations: Formula (or Block), Discretionary, and Congressional Earmarks. Note that most OJP and other Federal agency grant funds are dispersed through Formula grant programs and Congressional Earmarks.

**Formula (or Block)**

- Awarded to State and local governments based on a predetermined formula, which may be based on a jurisdiction's crime rate, population, or other factors.
- Awarded to agencies in each State designated by the governor. These agencies are called [State Administering Agencies \(SAA\)](#).
- Generally requires States to pass awards to local agencies and organizations via subgrants.

**Discretionary**

- Awarded on a competitive basis to public and private nonprofit organizations.
- Funding ranges from single awards for research, evaluation, and technical assistance to multisite awards for program development.

**Congressional Earmarks**

- Hard Earmarks: Congress directs the Federal agency to provide certain funds to specific programs it has identified.
- Soft Earmarks: Congress identifies a program and directs the Federal agency to:
  - o Evaluate the program.
  - o Fund the program, if warranted.

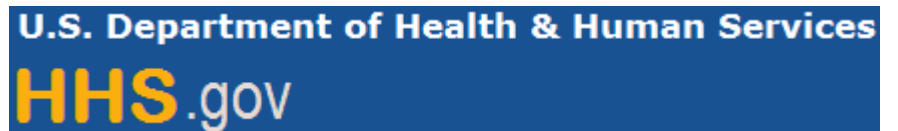

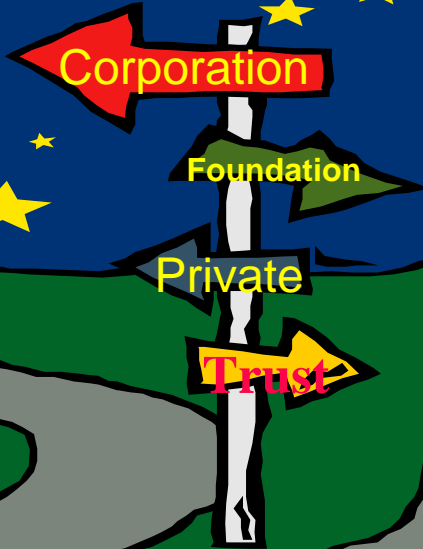

## MORNING BREAKOUT SESSION

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### **E-Warrants: Electronic Warrants Processing in Cook County**

Of the tens of thousands of arrest warrants issued annually by Cook County judges, up to 75 percent of them are issued from the bench in consequence of a defendant's failure to appear for a court proceeding. These bench warrants became a focal point of a joint project, funded by NCHIP, by the Circuit Clerk's Office, Chief Judge's Office, Chicago Police Department and a number of municipal law enforcement agencies, in conjunction with *DigitalBridge*, a Utah-based technology consulting firm.

Using *DigitalBridge* Digital Packet Technology, the Electronic Warrants Project (eWarrants) focused on bench warrants issued in District 1 (Chicago), District 5 (Bridgeview), and District 6 (Markham). A pilot of the application was conducted at Branch 29 (Chicago) in December 2007 and rolled out to the remaining locations as a live application a year later. The system was chosen because of its digital ecosystem, which enables protected information-sharing and transaction management that cross organizational boundaries.

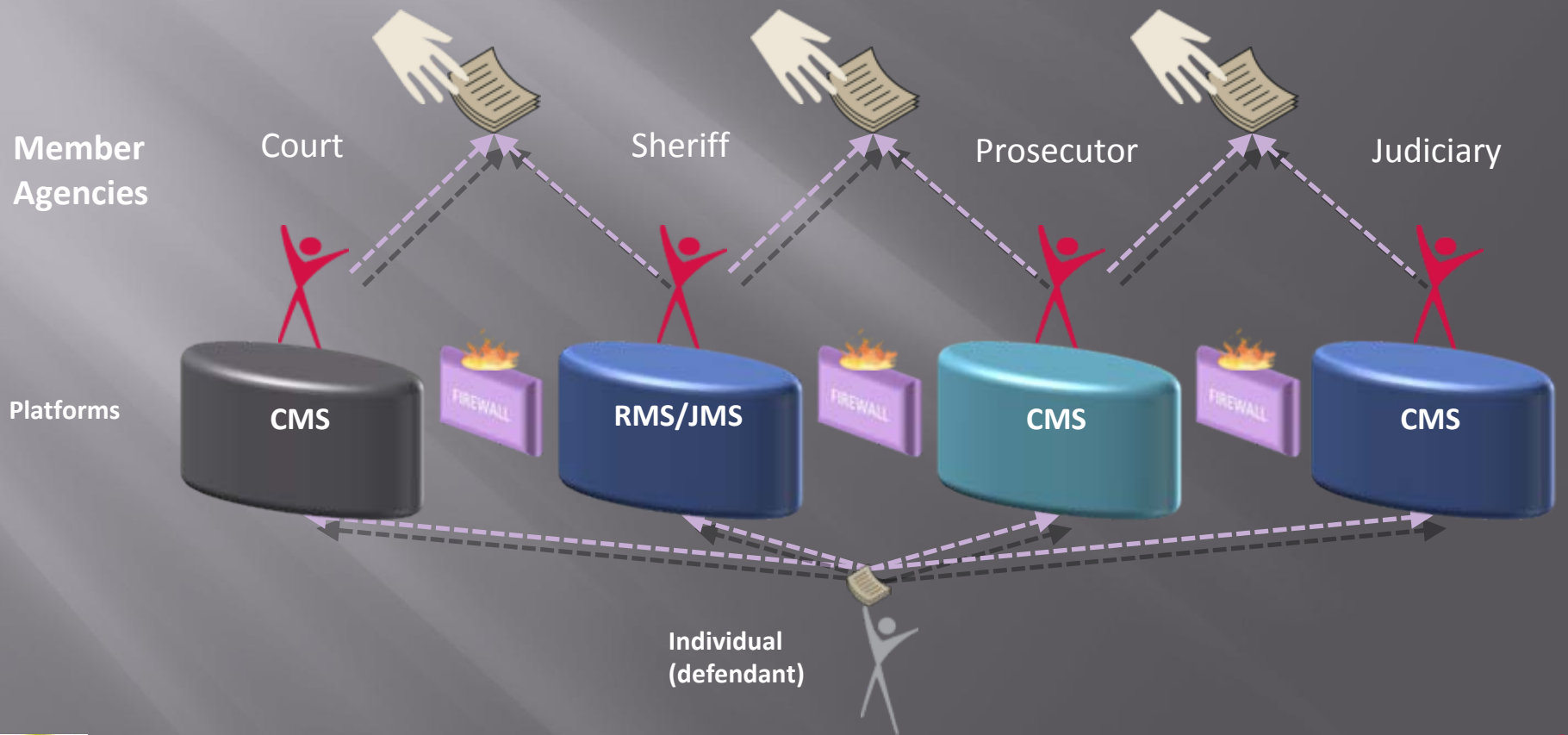

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### **Use of Technology to Integrate Criminal Justice Re-entry and Mental Health Court Project**

This presentation demonstrates the use of an Internet-based system to identify mentally ill detainees in any county jail, and expedite the re-entry process needed prior to release into their communities. This same system has been expanded to record data and statistical information for that individual if participation in a Mental Health Court Program is warranted. This creates a start-to-finish record of a criminal justice event and re-entry services record while utilizing technology and sharing capabilities.

Kathleen M. Nee serves as the Illinois Department of Human Services Division of Mental Health Jail Data Link Project Director for Cook and downstate counties, and the manager of Decision Support in the Central Office of the Division of Mental Health. Ms. Nee joined the Division of Mental Health in 1974 as a Personnel Assistant at Chicago-Read Mental Health Center. Over the next 20 years, Ms. Nee progressively served as a public servant in this division and was director of Human Resources from 1986 to 1999.

During her time as human resources director, Ms. Nee increasingly blended the use of technology with day to day operations, and ultimately advanced the use of technology in the clinical services arena with the Metro North Network of Greater Illinois. Ms. Nee continued efforts to blend technology with clinical systems to serve Illinois' mentally ill, with an emphasis on forensics and the jail/prison populations, with the determination to improve continuity of care, quality of life, and a recovery-oriented re-integration into their communities once released from jail.

Since that time, Ms. Nee has collaborated and established Jail Data Link Project partnerships with the Illinois Sheriff's Association, Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority, Proviso 708 Board, Cook, Will, Jefferson, and Peoria county jails, and numerous community service providers.

Dr. Freeman's primary focus in recent years has been working in collaboration with key stakeholders in Illinois to further mental health care for individuals in jails and prisons. Two primary initiatives led by Dr. Freeman in this regard include his role as project director for the SAMHSA-funded Community Reintegration Collaborative - Jail Diversion Expansion Initiative in Cook County, and the technology-based Jail Data Link program that identifies and facilitates linkage services for individuals with serious mental illness who are detained in county jails.

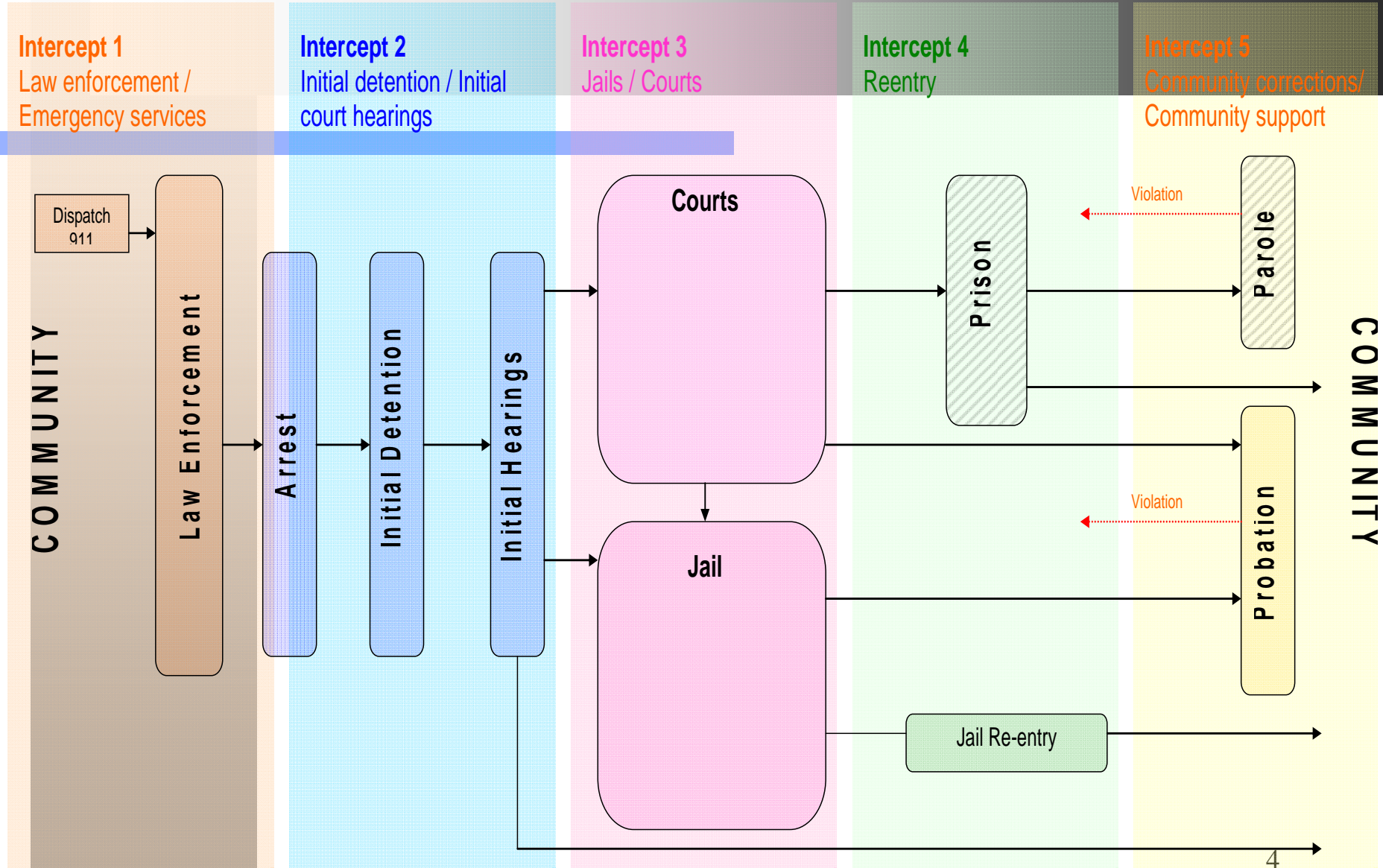

# Description of Jail Data Link

***The Jail Data Link program provides a web based computer cross match between the census in county jails and open DHS cases. The program identifies individuals in our targeted mental health population that should have been involved in services with community mental health providers, but have been detained in jail. The program also provides case managers located with community providers that provide linkage to community services from county jails, and functions as a screening tool for MH Court eligibility.***

# Historical Development of Jail-Data Link Project

- Initial concept 5/99 with CCDOC and 4 City pilot agencies through TOPS Federal grant.
- Initial idea developed in Access 97 database as “no money” project.
- Legislation changed the State Mental Health Confidentiality Act (740ILCS 110/9.2) to allow data sharing and compliance with HIPAA.
- Cook County Jail, Cermak hospital, 1<sup>st</sup> partner.
- Additional Cook County mental health agencies followed (*C-4, Thresholds, CMHC, Grand Prairie, LSSI, Pro Care and 5 City of Chicago agencies*).
- The current partnership has expanded to additional county jails and their associated providers. (*Community Resource Center (Marion) Jeff. Co. Comp. (Jefferson) Will Co Health Dept (Will) Human Services Center (Peoria) Robert Young Center (Rock Island), Janet Wattles, (Winnebago), Chestnut Health Systems (St Clair)*).



# Goals of Jail Data link

- **Re-link detainees that had previous documented community MH services back to the agency of record, or link to new agency based on discharge needs and assessment.**
- **Identify individuals detained in jails who were discharged from a State hospitals.**
- **Provide additional needed services to linked individuals (i.e., substance abuse, housing, supportive employment)**
- **Identify funding sources for specialized case management (i.e. 708 boards, federal funds transfer).**
- **Utilize JDL for Mental Health and Mental Health Court(s).**
- **Implement the expanded Database which now includes MH Court documentation and data collection capabilities throughout Illinois..**

# How Jail-Data-Link Works

- **On a daily basis, “cross match” by unique numeric identified, all County Jail detainees, with the state-wide DMH community services roster (outpatient) and State hospital roster (inpatient) and provide information to participating agencies, jails, mental health courts.**
- **Provides an “interactive” and dynamic database between users to facilitate communication.**
- **Provides clinical, demographic and historical information to agencies, jails, mental health courts, state’s attorneys’, and other criminal justice specialist to be utilized in continuity of care, determination of services, reintegration into the community follow up.**

# Did you know?

- That: Jails are the largest “inpatient” providers of mental health care in Illinois and the United States.
- That: Many individuals with mental illness do not self report their illnesses or medications upon jail intake screening for fear of segregation and victimization?
- That: Many detainees with M.I. will engage in a healthy clinical relationship with a home community agency case manager vs jail staff.
- That: Recent evaluation performed by the ICJIA indicated that the project should be expanded to additional sites.
- That: The system itself was “low cost” and extremely user friendly.
- That: The Project “improved” the quality and quantity to those mentally ill individuals detained in a county jail.



# How far has this project really gone?

- **Through funding from ICJIA four downstate counties of Jefferson, Marion, Will and Peoria counties were added in FY06 and in FY09 added Winnebago, St Clair and Rock Island counties.**
- **Proviso township 708 Board funds a Cook County Data-Link case manager for Jail and MH Court in collaboration with Pro Care community agency and TASC. Oak Park/River Forest township provides a case manager for Jail and MH Court in collaboration with Thrive community agency and TASC.**
- **Berwyn, Cicero and other townships are requesting presentations to their MH Boards/Commission for possible future funding and participation.**



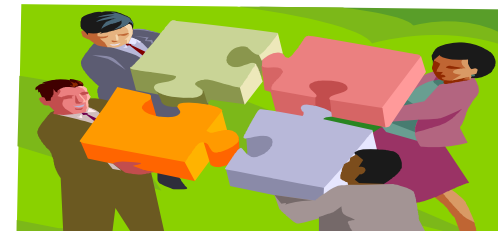

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### **Court Security Information System**

The presentation will provide an overview of the intent and purpose of the *Court Security Information System* designed by the Office of the Marshal of the Supreme Court of Illinois. This includes the background and need for readily accessible repository of information for sharing reported threats and assessments of potential threats to the members of the Illinois judiciary, and development of reporting protocols for referring potential threats. Design and implementation of an assessment process for referred threats all will be discussed, in addition to the automation of the repository in collaboration with the Judicial Management Information System, a division of the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts. Finally, testing and placement of the repository at select access points within the judiciary will be covered. The repository of information and sharing of that information relating to potential threats to members of the court and the court system in general was an original charge given the Office of the Marshal by the members of the court in 2006. The system is designed to represent all levels of the judiciary branch in Illinois, provide access to assessments and provide a system for the referral of threats to law enforcement agencies responsible for court security matters.

Robert A. Shay has been marshal of the Supreme Court of Illinois since April 2006. As marshal, he is responsible for safety and security of the Illinois Supreme Court, providing consultation on security matters for district appellate courts, and assisting circuit courts as requested. He retired after 24 years with the FBI, last serving as the FBI supervisor of the Springfield Division of the FBI's Joint Terrorism Task Force and the division's chief hostage negotiator. Prior to his career in the FBI, Marshal Shay was a police officer in Jacksonville, served as an assistant to the chief of the Springfield Police Department, and served as an associate director of an Illinois Law Enforcement Commission regional planning agency in Central Illinois.

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### **There is No Canned Solution: Champaign County Integrated Justice Information System**

On June 30, Champaign County celebrated one year of running on an integrated system. The three-vendor application provides a single point of entry for all case information that is then shared throughout the system. From booking through final disposition, it is now possible to view all case information from a single screen. Scanning and mug shots also are incorporated into every phase of the system. State's attorney, public defender, and court services users can keep detailed case notes on an individual case and view them separately or integrated with the court docket sheet. The system has reduced the amount of redundant data entry by nearly 75 percent, increased information availability, and allowed a single point of entry for reviewing and reporting information. Project pitfalls encountered, lessons learned, and future enhancements to be implemented by Champaign County in coming months also will be discussed.

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### **Chicago Police Department's Citizen and Law Enforcement Analysis and Reporting (CLEAR) Initiative**

This presentation will provide an overview of Chicago's CLEAR system, including discussion of current status and future direction. CLEAR is Chicago's enterprise information system, consisting of millions of records of incidents, arrests, field contacts, gangs, suspects, offenders, and more. The system includes advanced mapping and business intelligence components and management accountability tools. What began as a Chicago-only system has grown into I-CLEAR, the Illinois statewide version, and R-CLEAR, or Regional CLEAR, is now in development. R-CLEAR will serve the Great Lakes Region and will expand the system to include new incident reporting and crime analysis capabilities. Today, more than 32,000 users from 450 agencies at local, state, and federal levels utilize CLEAR. The components of CLEAR will be demonstrated, including the new public access website, CLEARpath. Chicago's advanced camera surveillance system and fusion center will also be presented.

**Jonathan Lewin**  
**Commander**

**Chicago Police Department Information Services Division**

Jonathan Lewin was appointed Commander of the Information Services Division of the Chicago Police Department on June 1, 2005. In this capacity, he manages technology for the department, including the Citizen and Law Enforcement Analysis and Reporting (CLEAR) application, the largest transaction police database in the United States and winner of the 2007 Innovations in American Government Award from the Kennedy School at Harvard University. CLEAR supports more than 32,000 users from more than 450 law enforcement agencies.

Commander Lewin oversaw technical implementation of the department's Crime Prevention and Information Center, an all-crimes, all-hazards fusion center, and manages the department's Police Observation Device cameras. He has conducted numerous community workshops, demonstrations, and focus groups throughout the city to shape development of cutting-edge applications. Commander Lewin serves as the superintendent's representative on the National Law Enforcement and Corrections Technology Advisory Council and served as an adjunct lecturer at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He was appointed chair of the Technology Committee of IIJIS Board in 2008.

Prior to his current appointment, he served as commanding officer of Continuing Education at the Education and Training Division, coordinator of the Technology Section of the Research and Development Division, and a field lieutenant and acting watch commander in some of the busiest districts in the city. Commander Lewin has completed training at the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety. He holds a bachelor's degree in administration of justice from Southern Illinois University and a master's degree in public policy and administration from Northwestern University.

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### **JWatch: An Integrated, Web-Based, Data/Case Management System for Juvenile Probation in the Second Judicial Circuit**

The 2nd Judicial Circuit of Illinois Juvenile Justice Data Project (JWatch) is an effort jointly supported by Redeploy Illinois and the MacArthur Foundation's Model for Change Initiative. The project's goal is to improve the 2nd Judicial Circuit's Probation Department's current automated case tracking systems capabilities, specifically as they relate to supervision of juvenile cases.

JWatch is an integrated software tool that supports the needs of the user community by collecting a wide expanded range of case-level juvenile justice data to better understand its juvenile offender population, better identify appropriate services and interventions, and provide a better understanding of program effectiveness and overall system performance. JWatch was created to fully support and integrate the needs of the 12 local probation departments in the judicial circuit and may be used by any probation and detention office in Illinois.

One of the guiding project principles has been to ensure that the data is fully integrated so that all users can access all appropriate data. The presentation will include a demonstration of the JWatch - Juvenile Probation application, a discussion of how a diverse user group was instrumental in the application design and decision making, and problems and successes along the way. Future development (JWatch-Detention) also will be discussed.

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### **Enabling the Business of the Courts: Integrated Justice in Action in Lake County**

Lake County has embarked on an aggressive journey to create a paperless criminal justice enterprise. Unlike many electronic filing processes, the documents are transmitted to the court electronically in the form of GJXDM and NIEM compliant XML with associated stylesheets. This presentation details how Lake County moved from “silos” of information to a seamless interface of an overall criminal justice system. The presenters will discuss developing a shared vision for justice information sharing, major categories of implementation including business planning and exchange analysis, architecture development, and exchange implementation. The speakers also will discuss the challenges they faced in implementation and lessons learned.

Joe Regis is director of information technology for the Lake County Circuit Clerk’s Office. Mr. Regis has worked for Lake County for more than 13 years, serving for the last seven years as project manager for the county’s integrated justice effort. In collaboration with the Lake County Circuit Clerk and the Lake County State’s Attorney, he led the implementation effort of GJXDM-based information exchanges including information, indictment, petition for revocation, and petition for rule to show cause. Mr. Regis also is managing the implementation of NIEM-based exchanges into and out of the Lake County Sheriff’s Office. These exchanges include incident (traffic and non-traffic), remand, release, and emergency order of protection.

Mr. Usery is a 24-year criminal justice industry veteran with extensive experience working with public sector and non-profit organizations. While at SEARCH, the National Consortium for Justice

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Information and Statistics, he was the project lead in developing the Justice Information Exchange Model (JIEM). JIEM has become a standard for documenting exchanges in the Justice Community. Also while at SEARCH, Mr. Usery provided technical assistance to justice agencies in automated systems development, automation planning, and was involved in a number of special research projects dealing with justice information technology planning.

Prior to SEARCH, Mr. Usery served as chief information officer for the Colorado Integrated Criminal Justice Information System (CICJIS) and led the integration of statewide systems to create a single means of accessing and moving data through the criminal justice system. CICJIS was the first of its kind, of this scope, in the nation.

In addition to his work with CICJIS, Mr. Usery served as the director of information systems at the Colorado Department of Corrections for six years. During this time, he led a major conversion from a mainframe to an open systems platform.

  - Reminds us to consider the goals of our agency in light of the goals of a grant program
  - Considers the agency stakeholders
  - Provides organizational acceptance
  - Link mandates and external opportunities and mandates
  - Shadows an effective implementation process
  - Helps identify risks through SWOT analysis

# Implementation of Integration

- Requires strategic planning to be an ongoing effort in your organization (living documents – not paper sitting on a shelf)

- Requires a more formal project management structure
  - Who Approves Grant Projects?
  - Who monitors status on projects?
  - Who is the project sponsor?

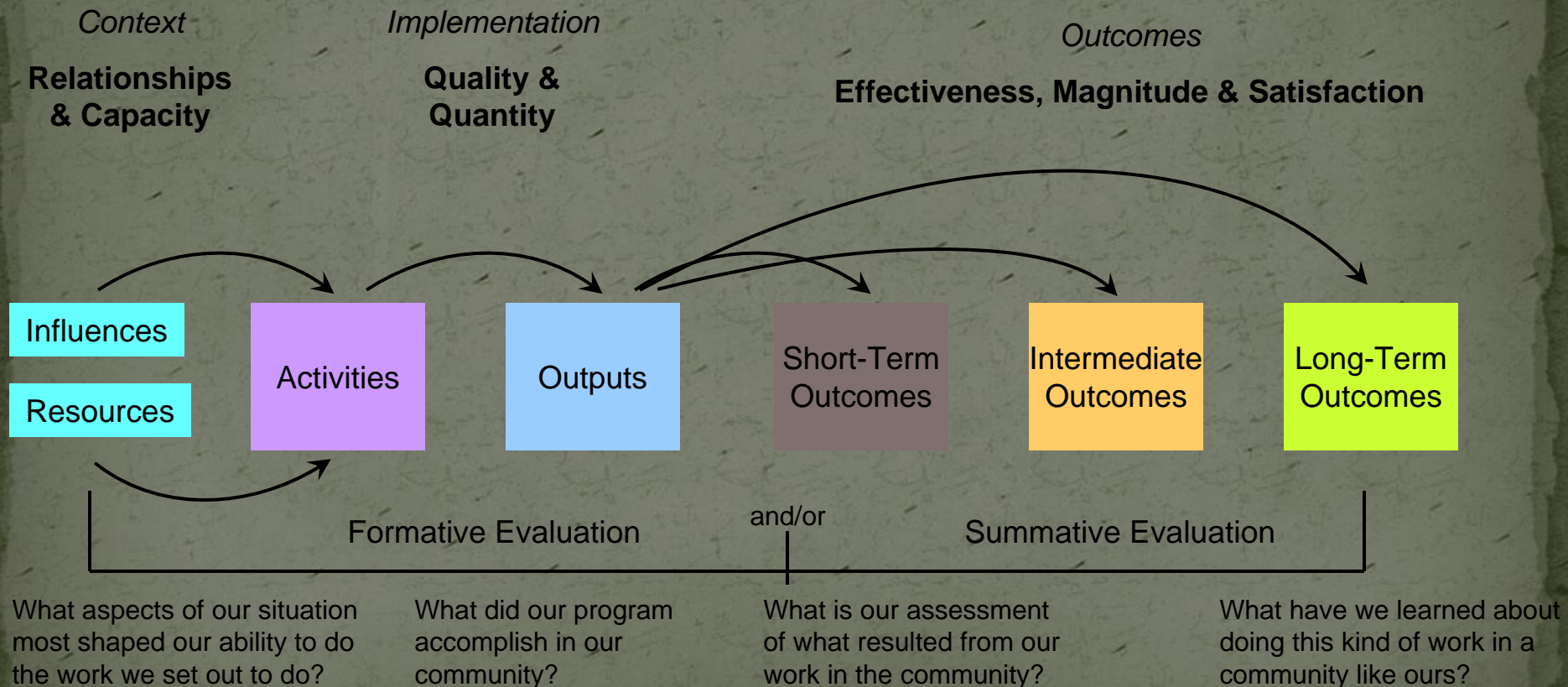

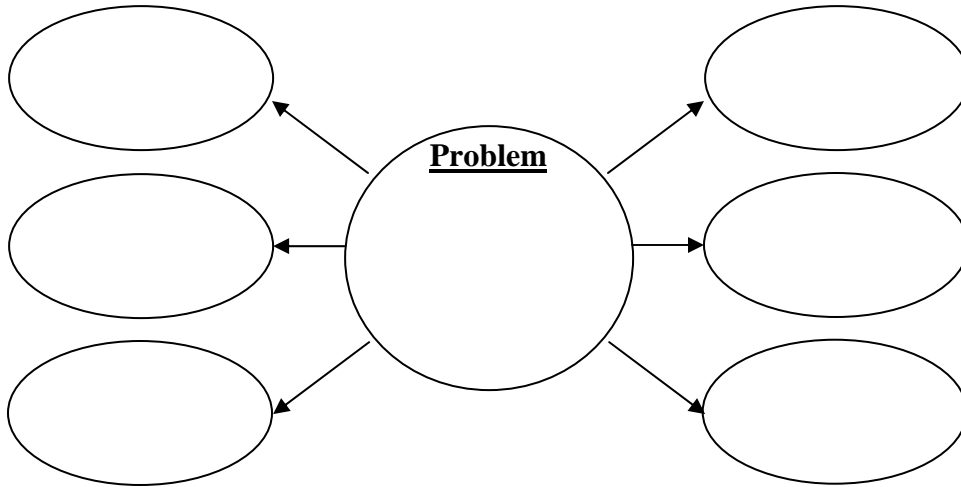

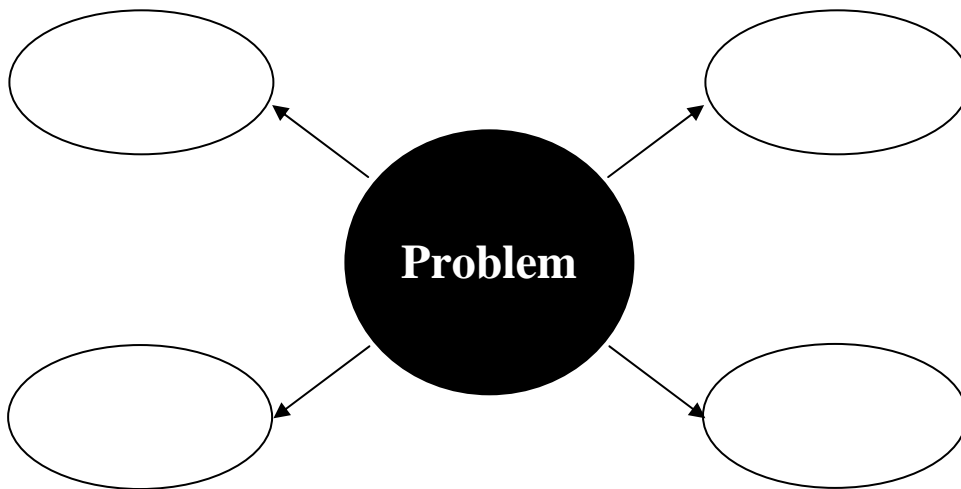

## GENERAL SESSION III

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### **So Long, Crunchy Old Yellow Ticket: Electronic Ticketing Information Sharing Initiative**

The circuit court clerks from Will, Kane, McHenry, DeKalb and DuPage counties are working on a uniform e-citation application. This application provides the law enforcement agencies an electronic citation process including data management, reporting, administrative features, and an integrated process with court case management systems. Circuit clerks pre-populate information, such as violations, streets, and court dates, to an agency. The police officer simply logs into their computer in the squad car and the data is downloaded. Officers may key in or swipe a defendant's driver's license and information from various state or law enforcement systems and the program automatically populates the citation with name, date of birth, height, and other personal identifiers. The officer completes any remaining information needed and the citation data and an image is electronically transmitted to a main server repository. Law enforcement administrative features provide review and transmittal functions to balance, report to state agencies, and electronically send the citations to court case management systems.

The electronic citation process allows for more timely and accurate information, enhanced officer safety, seamless data integration, and increased efficiency. Other benefits include case and defendant data transmissions to Secretary of State, Illinois Department of Transportation, and Illinois State Police match up perfectly to data sent by the clerk for reporting.



# Cook County's eTicketing Project



## **End-To-End Integration from Squad Car to the Clerk of the Circuit Court:**

The project scope includes implementing a system to create, capture, transmit, store, and retrieve traffic-stop citation data in electronic format. The images will ultimately be stored in the Clerk's document management repository and integrated with our electronic docket (specific to a docket entry).

**Traffic Citation, Y-Ticket Only:** The project scope currently only includes Y-Ticket functionality, but may expand later to include other tickets. Data entered into the system will still print out horizontally and can be used with the printer that uses thermal paper or the printer that can print on existing Y-Tickets

**Initial Implementation with Select Agencies:** Implement with 5 pilot agencies representative of Cook County police agencies, who demonstrate some technical capabilities or would require technical upgrades to participate; then expand to include 20 additional pilot agencies

**Future Scope:** Future Scope to include implementation in the remaining law enforcement agencies in Cook County
