

IJIS OUTREACH COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES (FEBRUARY 2004—OCTOBER 2004)

OVERVIEW

Since the February 11, 2004 IJIS Implementation Board meeting, the Outreach Committee has met four times, with a meeting occurring every other month. Membership of the Committee has remained solid and recruitment efforts have been successful, with our newest member representing the Illinois Emergency Management Agency.

The Outreach Committee has been established to communicate the goals, objectives, and vision of the IJIS initiative. Our strategies have been focused on developing vehicles for getting the message out. The following outlines the Committee's activities to date and some recommended strategies for realizing the vision of IJIS.

COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

Outreach Committee

To reach out to the Illinois justice community, the Outreach Committee has proposed an Illinois Integrated Justice Summit for Spring 2005, to bring awareness to the various stakeholders about integration and the importance of improving the quality, accuracy, accessibility and timeliness of criminal history information of the justice system.

The Committee envisions justice stakeholders from across Illinois participating in this event where guest speakers lecture about best practices in the field, vendors provide demonstrations of the newest technological solutions, and executives & project managers network with others, sharing experiences about their integration projects currently underway in their respective areas.

Additionally, the Outreach Committee has drafted a House Resolution that acknowledges the effort of the IJIS Implementation Board and requires the Board to submit the Annual Report to the leadership in the House of Representatives. The Committee feels that taking this extra step ensures full coverage and support of the legislature for the Illinois Integrated Justice initiative.

Finally, the Committee has developed a proposed budget around the plans and priorities of the IJIS initiative. The proposed budget is broken down by Subcommittee and is an itemized summary of recommended strategies for marketing the IJIS initiative.

Presentations Subcommittee

The Presentations Subcommittee has developed a standard PowerPoint presentation, which members of the Outreach Committee have used in communicating the vision of the IJIS effort to several justice stakeholder groups, including the Illinois State's Attorney Association and the Illinois Association of Court Clerks. The PowerPoint has also been updated based upon the Implementation Board's recommendation (See Exhibit I). Also the Committee has launched its campaign to recruit members of the justice community to "champion" the integration cause for their respective agency or county. To date, we have secured the membership of over 30 people interested in championing the cause for their county or agency. (See Exhibits II & III for the updated Champion Letter and Response Card)

Educational Materials

The Educational Materials Subcommittee, in conjunction with IIJIS staff, finalized and issued the IIJIS E-Newsletter in June 2004 (See Exhibit IV). The distribution list included all justice associations of Illinois, the IIJIS mailing list (from website) and others who have signed up to become champions of integration. The Subcommittee has since started work on the next issue, and have enlisted the support of the other Committees—Technical, Planning & Policy, Funding—to help develop their respective sections in the IIJIS E-Newsletter.

Media Strategy

The Media Strategy Subcommittee has investigated several media & print outlets for marketing the Illinois Integrated Justice initiative. The Subcommittee has recommended several television opportunities that provide the needed exposure of the Illinois initiative. Clerk Brown (Circuit Court of Cook County) offered to dedicate a Cable Access Network-Television (CAN-TV) Show that runs quarterly for the Circuit Court Clerk's Office ('Clerk of the Court Live') to Integrated Justice. A proposal was drafted, with information about the possible program dates, interviewers, guests, interview questions and projector materials. The next quarter for the show will be January to March 2005. (See Exhibit V)

The Subcommittee also researched opportunity for taping 5-minute spots on *NEWSMAKERS*, a news segment that feeds into CNN Headline News. The air times and markets can be controlled by the IIJIS Implementation Board. Additionally, there are 30- or 60-minute forum style programs available to IIJIS for discussions about Integrated Justice. The program will be produced and distributed through Comcast Cable.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Outreach Committee recommends the following items for approval by the Implementation Board:

- (1) Illinois Integrated Justice (IJ) Summit
- (2) Cable TV Appearances with approval of the Governor's Office ('Clerk of the Court Live,' Comcast Newsmaker, & IJ Forum)
- (3) House Resolution supporting the concept of an Integrated Justice System
- (4) Proposed IIJIS Outreach Committee Budget

A little bit about Illinois.....



- Land of Lincoln
- Known as the transportation center of the United States.
- Illinois is an important agricultural state with farms covering more than 80 percent of the state's area.
- Metropolitan Chicago, the country's leading rail center, is also a major industrial, as well as a commercial and financial center.
- The Illinois River forms the greater part of the Illinois Waterway, which links the Great Lakes with the Mississippi.

The Washington D.C. Snipers



14 September 2002

A witness told police that the offenders in a shooting at the Hillandale Beer & Wine store were driving a dark colored Chevrolet Caprice.

3 October 2002

A witness told police that they saw a dark colored Chevrolet Caprice drive away from the scene of the Washington D.C. sniper killing.

The **ability** to check **incident level data** across jurisdictions could have tied the two shooting incidents together, provided vehicle information about the snipers, and prevent further killing.

The ability to run the Chevrolet Caprice against other incident level data could have **tied the two shootings**

The crime **pattern** established by both shootings could have provided the police in the **ten subsequent sightings** of the vehicle with information that would have justified further investigation, which possibly could have brought the sniper investigation to an **earlier conclusion**.

Integration Functions

- Query** local, regional, statewide and national databases;
- Push** information to another agency based on actions taken within the originating agency;
- Pull** information from other systems for incorporation into the recipient agency system;
- Publish** information regarding people, cases, events and agency action; and
- Subscription** for an authorized agency.

What is Integration?

Integrated justice information sharing generally refers to the ability to share **critical information at key decision points** throughout the justice enterprise.

- The car that John Muhammad and John Malvo were arrested in during the course of their serial killings was spotted **two** times.
- Newspapers claim that after the arrest, the investigation of the car the snipers were driving shows the license plate was run by various police agencies at least **ten times** during the shooting spree.
- This means police may have confronted the offenders at least **ten times**, but had no knowledge that the suspect vehicle may have been used in a crime.

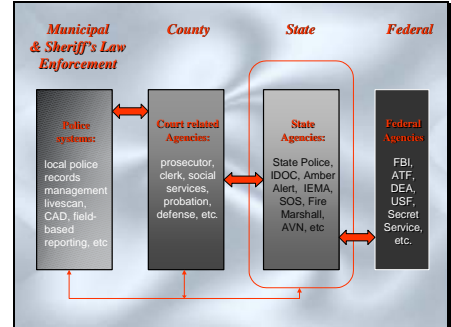

The Need For Integration

IIJIS Enhancing Timely Decision Making Through Statewide Information Sharing

Solution: Enter Once, Use Often

- Offender-related information is entered directly into a computer system by arresting or reporting officer
- This information is transferred electronically to all "upstream" justice agencies (as needed)
- Information may be enhanced but will never be re-entered manually

IIJIS Enhancing Timely Decision Making Through Statewide Information Sharing

Initiatives Proposed to NGA

- Establish an integration governing body
- Conduct a statewide needs analysis with feasibility study and data audit
- Replace paper-based information transfers with electronic "real-time" transfers at known justice information exchange points

Why Now?

- Technologies are **now available** that facilitate integration while using existing systems infrastructure.
- Federal Government is **emphasizing** justice systems integration.
- It has become clear that paper and batch data exchanges necessitated by silo systems are **not** as efficient.

Outreach to Counties Engaged in Integration

- On June 30, 2003, individuals working on county-level integration met to discuss common needs.
- McLean, Lake, McHenry, Tazewell, Champaign, Sangamon, Kane, DuPage, Will and Cook are engaged in justice systems integration activities.
- There is a need for coordination so that individuals working on integration at the county level will know what their counterparts in other counties are doing.



Converting Mission to Objectives

- Establish** and oversee advisory committees as needed to research and make recommendations on a variety of integration issues.
- On an ongoing basis, **oversee, prioritize, and review** integration initiatives to ensure they achieve IIJIS goals and objectives.
- On an ongoing basis, **devise** strategies to manage risks and resolve obstacles.
- Annually **update** strategic plan to provide ongoing and long-term direction.

We cannot ignore spending the necessary money to implement an Integrated Justice System in Illinois, **without delay**, which will act as the **bedrock foundation** to our local, state and national homeland security.




Primitive Nature of Information Sharing among Justice Agencies in Illinois

The reports include the survey responses of 230 justice agencies including 120 police departments, 31 circuit court clerk's offices, 29 probation departments, 27 sheriff's offices, and 22 state's attorney's offices.

Develop and support standards to enable sharing of information between local jurisdictions, to state systems and other states, as well as national systems opening a gateway to relevant national/federal systems.



 - Reviewing what other states have accomplished in the area of information sharing solutions.
- Outreach**
 - Developing informational and educational materials related to justice integration.
 - Seeking 'Champions' for integration effort.
- Funding**
 - Identifying potential sources of revenue to fund integration efforts.



Although the integration of criminal justice has been in the planning stages for a number of years, the continual threat of terrorism, the serial sniper rampage in the Washington D.C. area, the possibility of an unregistered sex offender driving your children or grandchildren's school bus, or innocent people being unjustly arrested because they bear the same name as an offender who has an active arrest warrant is loudly signaling the imminent necessity for justice agencies to integrate. Our world has been forever changed and we must move forward without delay to establish the bedrock foundation for our statewide and national homeland security. Presently the costs associated with the fragmented criminal justice system are high and not very efficient. The taxpayers in the State of Illinois deserve better. We are asking for your support in becoming a *Champion* or recommending a *Champion*.

Integration is the ability to access and share critical information at key decision points throughout the justice enterprise. This concept has always been the backbone of all detailed criminal investigations but now we can eliminate the waste and inaccuracies of redundant data entries and share all crucial information instantly with every justice agency at the county, state and even the federal level. The technology is now available to make this integration a reality and there is no time to waste.

Justice agencies in the State of Illinois resoundingly support Illinois' plan to integrate our criminal justice system. The research conducted by the Illinois Integrated Justice Information System (IIJIS) Governing Board evaluating the current state of integrated justice in Illinois has confirmed the absolute necessity for interoperability between all our criminal justice agencies. While there appears to be a significant amount of automation within police departments in Illinois, the survey found that there is almost a total lack of electronic data sharing between municipal and county police departments and the other components of the criminal justice system. Also, there is minimal or no sharing of information between the 102 counties in the State of Illinois, and the sophisticated criminals and terrorists are well aware of our deficiencies.

In order for this plan to succeed, it is essential that it receive your unwavering support and commitment. We are not asking you to dip into your already strapped budget. This project requires no General Revenue funding from FY04 and FY05. Funding for at least the first two years of this plan will be provided by federal grant funds already designated by the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority. Please keep in mind,

that in the long run, every dollar we invest in prevention will save us ten or more dollars in remedial costs. Those remedial costs for 9-11 are literally incalculable.

This is a win, win situation. As a result of this plan, Illinois will experience a greatly enhanced system of justice, public safety, and homeland security. By planning our integration to interface with federal standards, we will be at the forefront of the nationwide effort to guarantee our children and our families the protection that they deserve in this great country; protection that we dare not ignore at this most critical time in our history.

As with any project of this magnitude, its success is dependent upon the passion and commitment of the people who are dedicated to making it a reality. We need people throughout the state who will pledge to champion this quintessential cause. We are asking for you to take the time to find individuals in your county who will seize the day and will truly commit to being dedicated "champions" of criminal justice integration in Illinois.

We greatly appreciate your attention to this most critical project and we anxiously await your response. The essence of integration is cooperation. This critical project cannot succeed without a commitment from everyone in the Criminal Justice System to attain our common goal that benefits the entire State of Illinois. You can begin to fulfill your commitment right now by pledging your support, sponsoring a demonstration, or hosting a meeting. IMPLEMENTATION BOARD

Recognizing the need to share critical information, the Illinois Integrated Justice Information System (IJIS) Governing Board was established. This board, comprised of representatives from state, county, and municipal justice agencies, was charged with developing a plan for justice information sharing in Illinois. Their report, the Illinois Integrated Justice Information System Strategic Plan was completed in December 2002. In order to implement the strategic plan developed by the IJIS

Board, Governor Blagojevich (Executive Order 16-2003) created the Illinois Integrated Justice Information System Implementation Board and authorized the Board to promote integration throughout Illinois, to coordinate the development and implementation of strategies for sharing information, to establish standards, to facilitate electronic information sharing, and to promulgate policies that protect the privacy rights of the citizens of Illinois.

IJIS GENERAL INFORMATION MISSION

Our purposes are to:

- Bring stakeholder organizations together to comprehensively and effectively plan justice information systems;
- Coordinate information systems development activities;
- Build and expand the range of effectiveness of information systems and sharing capabilities; and
- Improve the effectiveness, efficiency, timeliness, accuracy and completeness of information.

Illinois Integrated Justice Information System

The Illinois Integrated Justice Information System (IJIS) Implementation Board was given responsibility to coordinate the development and implementation of strategies for sharing justice information. These efforts have been guided through the *IJIS Strategic Plan*, which led to **two related tracks** for implementation development:

1. Integration strategies that enhance the ability of justice decision-makers -- police, prosecutors, defense attorneys, judges, probation officers, and corrections officials -- to access offender history (e.g., criminal history record, court case history, Secretary of State driver's abstract) and current status (e.g., warrants, open court cases, on probation/parole) information needed to support critical decisions.
2. Integration strategies aimed at improving workflow associated with routine offender processing.

Privacy Policy Subcommittee

IJIS has also instituted a Privacy Policy Subcommittee composed of a diverse group of criminal justice practitioners, as well as several private organizations, to review privacy issues affecting the sharing of justice information in Illinois. The committee is currently reviewing the application of private sector Fair Information Practices, to justice data.

ILLINOIS INTEGRATION EFFORTS



Exemplary Program in McLean County

McLean County, Illinois, has one of the most successful integrated justice systems in the nation. The McLean County Integrated Justice Information System (IJIS) utilizes a unified database that begins with the original police report. Information gathered at each stage of the criminal process is entered into the system and made available to authorized users. Information is collected utilizing the following modules:

- Law Enforcement
- Jail Management
- Courts/State's Attorney
- Probation

COOK COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT CLERK

The Cook County Circuit Court Clerk is currently involved in three important integration initiatives. The first effort, the "Data/Capture Browser Based Access" initiative involves the creation of a relational database for criminal case information. The second effort, "Core Systems Improvement" involves the web enabling of the Clerk's files to allow greater access by the criminal justice community. The third effort, the "Data Exchange Points Pilot Project" involves the electronic sharing of information with the Chicago Police Department in an effort to improve the quality of disposition reporting.



COOK COUNTY

Cook County is undergoing a countywide planning process for integration, the Cook County Integrated Criminal Justice Information System (CCICJIS) committee. CCICJIS was created by county ordinance and submitted their strategic plan to the Cook County Board of commissioners on May 1, 2003.

SANGAMON COUNTY

Sangamon County (Springfield) recently (2003) released an RFP to build a countywide integrated justice system. The Integrated Criminal Justice/Public Safety Information Systems Upgrade project will include:

- Computer Aided Police & Fire Dispatch
- A Requirements Management System
- A Jail Management System
- New Mobile Data Computing software
- Automated Police Field Reporting
- A Fire Management System

ISP/CPD I-CLEAR

I-CLEAR is an incident-based police database that will allow Illinois police officers to track patterns of criminal activity statewide. I-CLEAR will contain any information that results in a police report, including information that does not result in an arrest. I-CLEAR is a cooperative program that will be run jointly by the Illinois State Police and the Chicago Police Department. Full deployment is expected within three years. I-CLEAR information will also be made available over IWIN, the State Police wireless information network.

ICJIA PIMSNet

PIMSNet is a new Windows based version of the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority's Police

SPECIAL INTEREST STANDARDS

Extensible Markup Language (XML)

GLOBAL JUSTICE XML DATA DICTIONARY

The development of standards is key to justice integration and data sharing. One such standard is the Justice XML Data Dictionary.

The Justice XML data dictionary organizes data into six Super Types - Person, Property, Organization, Location, Contact Information, and Activity. These Super Types contain approximately 2000 unique data elements that have been incorporated into nearly 300 reusable components, which are being recommended for use by justice agencies. Information Management System (PIMS). PIMS is a police records management system, managed by the Authority, that services 50 Illinois police departments. PIMSNet provides police agencies with an updated incident reporting and police management system including calls for service, case reporting, case management, and administrative reports.

NATIONWIDE EFFORTS

Minnesota

CriMNet is designed to support the exchange of data across disparate criminal justice information systems. Participating state, county, and municipal criminal justice agencies are connected to CriMNet through Integration Middleware and Web Services Hubs. The hub provides the means to share information with other local systems and provides pointers to additional data. Agencies have control over their own data and determine how and when that data is made accessible via CriMNet.

CriMNet provides access to the following information:

- Court Information
- Arrest Photos
- Statewide Supervision System
- Predatory Offender Registry
- Live-Scan booking information
- Victim Information and Notification
- Driver's License Information



Pennsylvania

JNET serves as a platform for knowledge sharing among state and local justice agencies.

Access to JNET not only allows participants to search state-level justice agencies, but also provides county justice practitioners with a single data integration platform, the County Justice Hub, to support local information sharing needs.

The Justice Hub design enables justice practitioners to perform the following functions in a real-time manner:

- Obtain Criminal History Records
- Obtain Juvenile Information
- Obtain Driver's License Photos
- Locate Inmates
- Query other agency's systems
- Obtain photographs, fingerprints, and documents

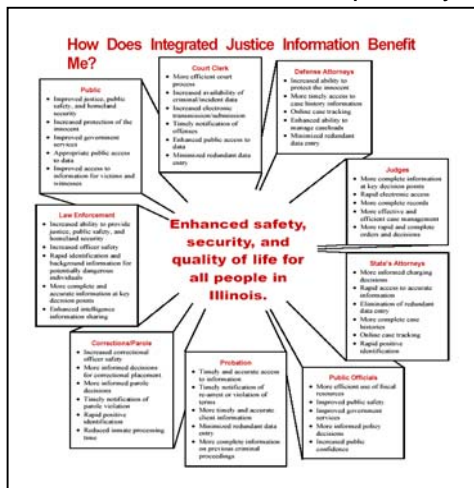
