The minutes of the Committee meeting held on July 7, 2009, were approved.

The Committee welcomed its newest member, Eric C. Weis, State's Attorney, Kendall County.

1. Funding for FYE June 30, 2010.

Committee has received funding of \$125,000 for FYE June 30, 2010, administered through ICJIA.

David Olson reported that Loyola University has entered into a contract, approved by Messrs. Sullivan and Schwind, to take effect October 1, 2009, with a cap of \$45, 000.

2. *Fifth Annual Report.*

Mr. Sullivan reported that he will distribute a revised draft of the Committee's Fifth Annual Report, which covers the Committee's activities during the year 2008. He urged all members to study the draft carefully and provide him with edits, suggestions, and the like.

3. *David Olson's reports regarding Loyola University surveys.*

Mr. Olson reported that he had sent a letter to the non-responding State's Attorneys and PDs, urging them to answer and return the surveys to Loyola University for coding and analysis.

Mr. Olson also reported that he had communicated with the Assistant to the Executive Director of the Administrative Office for Illinois Courts, to obtain support for a survey to Illinois trial court judges. Mr. Olson will report further at the next Committee meeting.

Mr. Olson distributed a revised summary of the sentences that were imposed by Illinois judges on 9,218 persons convicted of first degree murder and admitted to prison during the period July 1, 1989 through June 30, 2009, 150 of whom received death sentences. The tables, attached as Appendix 1, include an analysis of the total, and by county, separated into pre-moratorium (July 1988 through December 1999), post- moratorium through passage of reforms (January 2000 through June 2005), and post-reforms (July 2005 through June 2009). These statistics show:

- “the proportion of first degree murderers sentenced to death statewide fell from 1.9 percent in the pre-moratorium period to 0.8 percent in the post-reform passage period (Table 1). In purely statistical terms, this decrease from 1.9 percent to 0.8 percent translates to roughly a 50 percent reduction in the likelihood of the death penalty being imposed over these time periods.”

- “Across all separate geographic regions of Illinois examined (Tables 2 through 6), the proportion of first degree murderers sentenced to death fell between the pre-moratorium and post-reform periods.”

4. *Reports of subcommittees.*

(1) *Report of Subcommittee 1 - Police and investigations.*

Mr. Coldren reported that the subcommittee had approved a recommendation, attached to the Agenda for this meeting as Appendix 1. The recommendation concerns use of blind administrators or blind procedures during eyewitness identifications in lineups and photo spreads. It will be discussed at the next Committee meeting. Mr. Schwind stated that several of the officers who attended the Committee meeting on March 9, 2009 were prepared to return at the next Committee meeting to discuss this recommendation. Mr. Sullivan stated that the subcommittee’s recommendation would be postponed until the next Committee

meeting, in order to afford the officers an opportunity to appear and discuss the recommendation.

Mr. Coldren said that before the next Committee meeting, subcommittee 1 will consider whether to recommend reforms to eyewitness identification procedures, including whether all identification procedures should be electronically recorded.

(2) Report of subcommittee 2 - Eligibility for capital punishment and proportionality.

Ms. Bienen reported that the subcommittee continues to collect indictments. She requested the chair and co-chair to send another letter to State's Attorneys who have not yet fully responded to prior requests for indictments, which Messrs. Sullivan and Schwind said they will do.

Mr. Olson stated that he has a list of everyone who was convicted in Cook County and the collar counties, which he will provide to Ms. Bienen.

Mr. Sullivan called attention to Appendix 2 to the Agenda, also attached to these minutes as Appendix 2, an email from Robert L. O'Malley dated July 19, 2009, with an attached spreadsheet of capital cases the Cook County Public Defender has on file from the late 1990s to the present, showing case numbers, race of defendant and victim, and qualifier for capital punishment. (FM stands for felony murder.)

(3) Report of subcommittee 3 - Trial court proceedings.

Attached to the Agenda for this meeting as Appendix 3 is an email dated July 15, 2009 from Mr. Howard, subcommittee chair. Attached to the email are nine jury instructions and two jury verdict forms the subcommittee recommends be used in capital cases. It was agreed that the Committee will consider these instructions and verdict forms at the next meeting.

(4) Report of Subcommittee 4 - Post-conviction proceedings, DNA and general topics.

The Committee members discussed the current status of the Capital Litigation Trust Fund. Several amendments to the statutes have been enacted regarding approval of the requests for payments by defense counsel. See HB 869, effective January 1, 2010. These provisions should provide a major step forward towards preventing the types of abuses that have come to light in the past.

With regard to the recommendation approved by subcommittee 4 on October 22, 2008, reprinted in the Agenda for this meeting (pages 2-3), it was agreed that this matter will be adequately covered in the Committee's Fifth Annual Report.

As to the DNA backlog, Mr. Hehner reported he learned that the Illinois labs had a current backlog of 9,000 samples to examine, analyze and report on.

There was a discussion of Senate Resolution 297, attached as Appendix 4 to the agenda for this meeting, regarding a study of the

incremental costs of capital punishment. It was reported that no funding has been appropriated for conducting this study.

5. Next meeting – Monday, October 26, 2009 at 1 PM.

It was agreed that the next full Committee meeting will be held on Monday, October 26, 2009 at 1 PM, at the office of Jenner & Block, 330 N. Wabash Avenue, 40th Floor, Chicago, IL.

General Overview

In an effort to examine the patterns of death penalty imposition across Illinois, researchers from Loyola University obtained detailed, offender-level data from the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) that included information pertaining to the 9,218 offenders convicted of first degree murder and admitted to prison in Illinois from July 1988 through June 2009, or state fiscal year (SFY) 1989 (which covers the period from July 1, 1988 to June 30, 1989) to SFY 2009. During this 21-year period, a total of 150 individuals were convicted and sentenced to death.

The tables on the following pages summarize the total number of offenders convicted of first degree murder in Illinois and the number and proportion of these offenders who received a determinate (i.e., sentenced to a specific number of years in prison), natural life, or death sentence across different regions of Illinois and across different time periods. The time periods used in the analyses were the “Pre-Moratorium” (July 1988 to December 1999), the “Moratorium & Governor’s Capital Punishment Commission” period (January 2000 to June 2005) and the “Post-Reform passage” period (July 2005 to June 2009).

Over the time periods examined, the proportion of first-degree murderers sentenced to death statewide fell from 1.9 percent in the pre-moratorium period to 0.8 percent in the post-reform passage period (Table 1). In purely statistical terms, this decrease from 1.9 percent to 0.8 percent translates to roughly a 50 percent reduction in the likelihood of the death penalty being imposed over these time periods. Across all separate geographic regions of Illinois examined (Tables 2 through 6), the proportion of first degree murderers sentenced to death fell between the pre-moratorium and post-reform passage periods.
