Program Description

Chicago Area Project will provide technical assistance, monitoring, and oversight to Legacy Reentry Foundation NFP Youth Adult Prevention program (YLAP). YLAP will provide outreach to 300-500 youth and adults that are or have formally been incarcerated, and youth and adults who have gang involvement or who are being actively recruited by gangs in Waukegan, Northeast Chicago, and Zion in Lake County, and will provide a variety of case management and prevention programming to 100 youth and 100 adults.

Program Activities

The LYAP will identify those members in the community in need of comprehensive case management and mentoring as a means of preventing future violence. Participants will be assessed and offered individualized and group mentoring. Youth will receive mentoring in topics such as life skills, conflict resolution, positive communication, decision making, anti-gang/anti-violence, and entrepreneurship. Adults will receive training in conflict resolution, decision making, record expungement, workshops, computer training, job readiness and employment opportunities.
