Detailed description of the program for which funding is requested:	The Violence Against Women Act Sexual Assault Service Program (SASP) was created in the reauthorization of the VAWA in 2005. It is a formula grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Justice's Office of Violence Against Women. SASP is the first federal funding stream solely dedicated to the provision of direct intervention and related assistance for victims of sexual assault. Overall, the purpose of SASP is to provide intervention, advocacy, accompaniment, support services, and related assistance for adult, youth, and child victims of sexual assault, family and household members of victims, and those collaterally affected by the sexual assault.

Also, victims fear reprisal from the offender, hours of waiting and questioning at police and state's attorney's offices, and further violation of their emotional and physical condition. Rape crisis services can aid the victim in navigating these barriers and aid with recovery and system responses.
